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# Okaloosa County opts against impact fees

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CRESTVIEW — Impact fees will not be instituted in Okaloosa County for the foreseeable future.

Commissioners have decided not to go forward with a \$90,000 study by MuniFinancial that would have looked at the feasibility of implementing impact fees.

"The people in this county and the surrounding counties are fed up with any fee," said Commissioner James Campbell.

"They voted against the sales tax. Although this is an impact fee, it is a form of a tax. I said we need to be careful. People are going to be saying 'The county's going to start sticking it to you.' I'm not going to be a part of that."

The commission as a whole had previously expressed interest in moving forward in studying impact fees.

Commissioners held a workshop earlier this year and decided then to look into impact fees. They agreed to seek proposals from companies to study the issue.

The vote to not move forward with impact fees was approved Tuesday 4-1, with Commissioner John Jannazo voting to continue with the study.

"We determined it was worth pursuing, so now I am extremely disappointed it's going to be business as usual for Okaloosa County," Jannazo said.

Commissioner Don Amunds was concerned impact fees could have been perceived as a way for the county to recoup money lost through recent tax reform, which he says is not the county's intention.

With the county possibly having to cut minor services because of less property tax revenue, Amunds said it would not look good to then spend \$90,000 on a
