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City Impact Fees Add \$5,000 To New Home

Impact fees adopted by the Bartow city commission will add about \$5,000 to the price of a new home, Gene Boles, the city's impact fee consultant from the University of Florida, told the city commission.

On Tuesday night, the commission adopted two more impact fees to pay for roads and for public buildings. A few weeks ago, the commission adopted a fee to pay for recreational facilities.

For years the city has had water and sewer impact fees.

Impact fees are imposed on new construction to help pay for new public facilities that are made necessary by growth.

Boles told the commission that Bartow's impact fees are comparable with those imposed by other cities in Polk County.

The city's new impact fee for roads is in addition to the one imposed by the county commission for county roads, he said. The city's fee will be used only for city streets.

The public facilities fee will be collected to pay for land and for facilities like city hall and police and fire stations.

Both of the new fees were adopted by unanimous vote of the city commission and without comment from the public at a public hearing.

At the request of the Polk County Builders Assn., the city delayed the effective date of the new impact fees until Nov. 1.

The commission also adopted a budget of \$54,315,632 (before inter-fund transfers) for the fiscal year that begins on Oct. 1. It maintains the present ad valorem property tax levy of 4.5 mills. That equates to \$4.50 per \$1,000 of taxable property value.

Gerald Cochran, speaking at a public hearing, was critical of the budget, and said the commission should adopt the "roll-back rate" for property taxes, the rate that would produce the same amount of revenue as last year.

Cochran also announced his annual "evaluations" of city officials: minus-10 for the city manager, plus-5 for the city auditor and city attorney, and plus-8 for the city clerk. Cochran said next year he will give evaluations to the commissioners, too.
